

From the Pastor's Desk

Dear Friends,

The transformation of a life is a process full of joys and frustrations – in our case, as the ones being transformed, these fall to us in ways that often cause discomfort. In fact, if we don't find ourselves uncomfortable with change, we might wonder how deeply the effect of that change is really taking hold in us. Is it just scratching the surface, or really getting into our core? But the difference that Christ is making in our lives is not purely aesthetic but runs at the core level through which we see and understand everything else.

How, then, do we put ourselves in the space to receive God's blessing of new life through loving Him with all of our strength? Acts of service are about love for neighbour (as we love ourselves; or even, as Christ loves them), and are not the physical expression of and trainers of love for God (with all our strength). The physical motions of personal piety are primarily in self-denial. It is our instinct to expend our strength in self-preservation, yet our faith teaches us to entrust our preservation to God's loving care. And so our love for God is trained through practising the self-denial of refusing to hold onto our own claims to our preservation. We are not self-sufficient but are wholly dependent on God's goodness. And this is made manifest in our lives as this self-denial, and full reliance on God, becomes natural to us through practise and Holy Spirit transformation.

We learn to let go of ourselves and to stop getting in the way of what God is working.

Complementary to this are the disciplines of fasting and almsgiving. The one denies that we are ruled by our bellies (for "humanity does not live by bread alone" Lk 4.4) and sets our eating in the ordered place of grateful reception of what God has provided – upon whom we rely. The other denies that we are slaves of our pocketbooks (we "cannot serve God and Mammon" Mt 6.24) and models God's generosity through good stewardship of God's resources entrusted to us for a time. Both of these spiritual disciplines have very physical realities attached to their practise and run contrary to our natural dispositions. Again, self-denial is involved in keeping them.

Finally, I would suggest that learning to really enjoy life whatever comes our way - is another way of loving God with our strength. The more we do so, the closer we creep to loving God with all of our strength. Related to this is the wonder and awe that we felt as children when Christmas Eve was upon us. All of life is a gift - God is moving in miraculous ways among us. Finding joy in whatever comes our way, and the ability to do so, is a result of trusting in God alone for our security. C. S. Lewis opined that the great obstacle [to charity, specifically, though by extension to any act of self-denial] is not in our love of self-indulgence (though this, too, may be a lesser obstacle), but in our fear of insecurity. The temptation to fear insecurity, and to act from that fear rather than trust in the God who provides, must be overcome in us if we are to love God with all of our strength.


